CALIFORNIA GOES ON ROCKS IN FOG

Tory Island, Off Northwest Irish
Coast, Scene of Mishap
to Anchor Liner.

IN NO IMMEDIATE DANGER

Bows Badly Stove In and Ship
Taking Water Through Two
Holes in Hold.

PASSENGERS STILL ABOARD

Ship Carries 1,000 Persons—Rescue
Vessels, Called by Wireless, Stand-
ing By Throughout Night.

LONDON, June 28.—The Anchor
liner California, with more than 1,000
persons aboard, has gone ashore on
Tory Island, off the northern coast of
Ireland. The destroyer Swift, the
fastest and largest vessel of her class
in the world, and other vessels have
gone to her assistance in response to
wireless calls for aid.

The ship is said to be in no im-
mediate danger.

LONDON, June 28.—In a thick
fog and rain which rendered Tory Is-
land invisible from the mainland, the
Anchor Line steamer California, bound
from New York for Glasgow, went
ashore on Tory Island, off the north-
west coast of Ireland. Wireless calls for
help brought speedy assistance from a number
of small gunboats and torpedo boats which
were patrolling the Northwest Irish
Coast for gun runners in connection
with the Ulster movement.

The latest news received here is that
the California is stuck fast on the rocks,
but is in no immediate danger. She
struck with such force that the lower
part of her bows was badly stove in,
and she is taking water through two
holes in her forehold and second hold.

The steamer, which has on board 121
crew members and 200 second cabin
passengers, lies in five fathoms of
water forward and seven fathoms aft.

The passengers and crew are still on
board. There was no panic when she
struck the rocks.

Several steamers, including one liner,
and the gunboats are standing by, and
others are expected to arrive at the
scene during the day.

DEWEY IN CANAL PARADE.

Will Be Invited to Make Trip Aboard
His Old Flagship Olympia.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Admiral
George Dewey may take his old flagship,
the Olympia, through the Panama Canal
next March in the naval parade. Rear
Admiral Clark, retired, has been ordered
to take command of his old ship, the
Oregon, for the occasion, and Secretary
Daniels said this afternoon that he had
decided to invite Admiral Dewey to take part
in the Olympia upon the arrival of
the present fleet there.

The President and Secretary Daniels
will make address upon the arrival of
the fleet at the exposition city. It is
likely that Admiral Dewey and Admiral
Clark also will speak. The entire tri-
angle of middlebore will be taken to
San Francisco for the occasion. This
will probably take the place of their annual
cruise.

The Oregon and the Olympia will be
moored at a specially constructed wharf
and will be on exhibition throughout the
entire exposition. The Oregon will be
anchored seven typical modern naval
ships—a dreadnought of the New York
class, a battlecruiser, a battleship, a
Connecticut or Minnesota type, an ar-
mored cruiser of the Tennessee or Mon-
rovia type, a torpedo boat, a submarine,
each of the latest build, and a collier.
The Oregon and the Olympia will re-
main throughout nearly the whole of the
exposition.

the Archduke are born Bosnians. Ga-
brinovic is a compositor, and worked

turned to Sarajevo a Serbian cham-
pion, and made no concealment of his
sympathies with the King of Ser-
bia. Both he and the actual murderer
of the Archduke and the Duchess ex-
pressed themselves to the police in the
most cruel fashion about their
crimes.

bomb, which was thrown by a young

The Archduke and his wife left the
Town Hall, intending to visit those
who had been injured by the bomb,
when a schoolboy 19 years old, named
Prinsip, who came from Grahovo,
fired a shot at the Archduke's head.
The boy fired from the shelter of a
projecting house.

It is feared that it will lead to serious
complications with that unruly king-
dom, and may have far-reaching re-

subject of general discussion. It is
felt that the Serbians have been
treated, too leniently, and some hard
words are being said about the pre-
sent foreign policy.

BRAVEFY OF ARCHDUKE.

Gave First Aid to Those Wounded
by the Bomb.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia, June 28.—Arch-
duke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the
Austro-Hungarian throne, and the
Duchess of Hohenberg, his morganatic
wife, were shot dead in the main street
of the Bosnian capital by a student today
while they were making an apparently
triumphant progress through the city
on their annual visit to the annexed
provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Were Bullet-Proof Coat.

The boy must have been carefully
